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1. Sporting Regulations - General

1.1. Title and Jurisdiction

The 2023 Welsh Sports and Saloon Car Championship (WSSCC) is organised and administered by the Welsh Racing Drivers Association (WRDA) (or any sub-committee it appoints) in accordance with the General Regulations of the Motorsport UK (incorporating the provisions of the International Sporting Code of the FIA) and these Championship Regulations.

For the time being and for the purposes of regulation and permit submission and operational event matters the WRDA may utilise the services of the BARC.

1.2.3. The Clerk of the Course (CoC) on the day will be advised in the event SRs.

1.2.5. Where appropriate, Motorsport UK Section G Regulations apply:

1.2.5.1 G2.7. Championship Stewards may only adjudicate on any disputes, irregularities or appeals arising from the approved Championship regulations.

1.2.5.2 G 2.7.1. Championship Stewards are also empowered to consider any request from the Championship Organisers to penalise any Competitor for any breach of Championship regulations after holding a formal hearing to impose a penalty in accordance with C.2.1.1 (subject to the rights of appeal provided for in Section C)

1.2.5.3 Also, any three Championship Stewards will constitute a quorum. In the event of any of the Championship Stewards listed above being unavailable or being unable to consider an issue due to a perceived conflict of interest, the organisers reserve the right to

appoint an alternative Championship Steward or, if deemed necessary more than one alternative Championship Steward.

1.3. Competitor Eligibility

1.3.1. Entrants must:

1.3.1.1 be current members of The Welsh Racing Drivers Association and

1.3.1.2 be registered for the Championship and

1.3.1.3 be in possession of a valid Motorsport UK Entrants Licences.

1.3.2. Drivers and Entrant/Drivers must:

1.3.2.1 be current Members of The Welsh Racing Drivers Association and

1.3.2.2 be Registered for the Championship and

1.3.2.3 be in possession of valid Competition (Racing) Race Club (UK only) Licence, *as a minimum*

1.3.2.4 If participation in the Championship requires absence from education a driver, in full time school education, is required to have the approval of their head teacher and a letter stating such approval from their school in order to fulfil registration for the Championship.

1.3.2.5 a driver shall not take time out of their education to participate in motor sport without the prior written approval of their education establishment.

1.3.3. All necessary documentation must be presented for checking at all the rounds when signing-on.

1.4. Registration

1.4.1. To be eligible for Championship points all drivers must register as competitors for the championship by completing the online Registration Form and sending the Registration Fee by cheque or by BACS to the Championship Organisers prior to the Final Closing Date of entries for the first round being entered. A further condition of registration is that an online Car Registration Form for each car used in the Championship must be submitted at least 60 minutes before the published start time of the event. Failure to submit a Car Registration Form will void the registration for that event so no championship points will be awarded.

1.4.2. The Registration fee for 2023 will be £160. Only registered competitors can compete for the Championship,

- 1.4.3. Registrations will be accepted from 1st January 2023 until the closing date for entries for the final round of the Championship.
- 1.4.4. Competition numbers will be allocated on request using a first come first served basis. The only exception to this will be the number One which will be reserved for the current champion. Should the current Champion choose not to use it, or not re-register for the Championship or there be Joint Champions, the number One shall not be used.
- 1.4.5. Competitors not registered for the Championship may be permitted on an individual round basis and
 - 1.4.5.1 be deemed guest competitors
 - 1.4.5.2 not score points
 - 1.4.5.3 not normally qualify for event awards other than Driver of the Race Award
 - 1.4.5.4 comply with the eligibility criteria as prescribed in article 1.3.2 above with the exception of 1.3.2 b as appropriate.
- 1.4.6. Guest competitors who compete in both WSSCC events at a meeting may be charged an administration fee of £20. After taking part in 2 rounds, Guest Competitors must then register for the championship.
- 1.4.7. Any competitor wishing to compete for a single race may do so at the discretion of the Championship Organisers but cannot claim points or awards other than Driver of the Race unless registered for the championship.

2. Championship Events

The 2023 Welsh Sports & Saloon Car Championship will be contested over 10 Rounds as follows - The format will be 1 qualifying session of at least 15 minutes with 2 races of at least 15 minutes duration. Where practical all will be held on the same day. For each meeting, practice and first race will constitute 1 event, each subsequent race will be a separate event.

3. Specific Championship Regulations

3.1. Scoring

- 3.1.1. A competitors championship points total will be the total for all rounds less the two lowest scores. Not starting a round will count as 0 points
- 3.1.2. Points will be awarded to registered competitors listed as classified finishers in the Final Results in each class

- 3.1.3. One extra point will be awarded for each competitor achieving the race fastest lap in his or her class on the day. In the event of only one starter in the class no point will be awarded for the fastest lap in the Class on the day
- 3.1.4. All registered competitors will receive a joker card which can be played at any race during the season to claim double points for that race. The Joker Card must be handed to the Race Day or Championship Co-ordinator or a nominated deputy 30 minutes prior to the start of the race or before entering the assembly area. If a competitor fails to nominate a round to play the Joker Card it will be automatically be played at the final round of the Championship, if however the competitor does not enter the final round the joker card will be forfeit.

- 3.1.5. Competitors may score Championship points in more than one class and use any car that is eligible for that class. Points are not transferable between classes. A competitor's final position in the Championship will be calculated from the highest number of points scored in a particular class.
- 3.1.6. Where two competitors share a car and compete in one race each, at a meeting, then provided that the driver combination is registered with the co-ordinator by the close of entries, points will be awarded to the driver pair, but not individually. They will appear as a joint entry in the Championship Points. No substitution is permitted from the original registered pair. The first named Driver on the entry form will be considered to be the entrant.
- 3.1.7. Should there be a tie in points the winner will be declared using Motorsport UK regulation W 1.3.4. Should there still be a tie, then the winner will be decided on the number of fastest laps in their class in qualifying. If still a tie the most second fastest laps in qualifying will be taken into consideration.
- 3.1.8. Advertising: Competitors will be required to carry advertising as supplied to publicise the championship in accordance with H29.1.1, H29.1.2 and H29.1.3 of the current Motorsport UK Yearbook in order to for qualify points.

3.2. Awards

- 3.2.1. All awards are to be provided by the Championship Organisers in conjunction with organising clubs where appropriate.
- 3.2.2. Trophies will be awarded for each round to 1st in Class for Classes 1,2,3,4 and 5. Trophies for other places in these classes will be at the discretion of the Championship Organisers subject to a minimum entry of 4 contenders per class. A Trophy for Driver of the Race will also be awarded for each round and all competitors are eligible for this award.
- 3.2.3. Championship Awards of a Trophy will be awarded to:
 - 1st Overall
 - 2nd Overall
 - 3rd Overall
- 3.2.4. In each class, Championship Trophies will be awarded to:

- 3.2.4.1 **1st in Class** for each class and for other class position dependent on number of entries, at the discretion of the Championship Organisers
- 3.2.4.2 The '**Newcomers Award**' to the best newcomer to the Championship as judged by the Championship Organisers
- 3.2.4.3 The '**Colin Gundersen Trophy**' for the Class Fastest Race Lap at Pembrey. All Registered competitors for the WSSCC are eligible for the Colin Gundersen Trophy. Competitors who are recorded in the official race results as setting the fastest lap in their class will score points by comparing a competitor's race fastest race lap with the lap record for that class (based on Class lap records starting from 2012). The current Class Lap Record is divided by the competitor's fastest race lap x 100 = points scored so a fastest lap that equals the current Class Lap Record will score 100 points. All WSSCC races at Pembrey will count.
- 3.2.4.4 The '**Blake Edwards Trophy**' for the Competitor having the most outright race wins
- 3.2.4.5 The '**Ladies Award**' for the woman driver scoring the highest number of points.
- 3.2.4.6 Other awards may be made at the discretion of the Championship Organisers.
- 3.2.5. All end of season Championship awards will be presented at the official awards ceremony, which will be organised by the Championship Organisers
- 3.2.6. **Presentations**
- Trophies will be provided for presentation at the end of each race or at an end of the meeting presentation ceremony.
- 3.2.7. **Title to all Trophies**
- In the event of any provisional results or championship tables being revised after any provisional presentations, and such revisions affecting the distribution of any awards the competitors concerned must return such awards to the Championship Organisers within 7 days.

3.3. Entries:

- 3.3.1. Competitors are responsible for sending in correct and complete entries with the correct entry fees prior to the closing dates which shall be determined by the event organising club. The Championship Organisers are responsible for mailing Supplementary Regulations and making available Entry Forms to all Registered Competitors in sufficient time for entries to be made prior to the published selection of entry dates for each round.

- 3.3.2. Incorrect or incomplete entries (Including Driver to be Nominated Entries) are to be held in abeyance until they are correct and the date of receipt for acceptance of entry purposes shall be the date on which the Secretary of the Meeting receives the missing or corrected information or fee.
- 3.3.3. Any withdrawal of Entry or Driver/Car changes made after acceptance of any entry must be notified in writing to the Secretary of the Meeting. If Driver/Vehicle changes are made after publication of Entry Lists with Final Instructions the Competitor concerned must apply for approval as per Motorsport UK Regulation D25.1.12
- 3.3.4. At the closing date entries of 40 or more competitors may be split into 2 races by class, at the discretion of the organisers, based on performance potential of cars entered for each class.
- 3.3.5. The maximum entry fee for each round shall be decided by the Championship Organisers
- 3.3.6. Reserves are to be nominated on the Final List of entries published with Final Instructions or Amendment Sheet Bulletins. All reserves will practice and will replace withdrawn or retired entries in Reserve number order irrespective of class. If reserves are given grid places prior to issue of the first grid sheets for any round, the time set in practice shall determine their grid positions. If reserves are given places after publication of the grid sheet and prior to cars being collected in the official "Assembly Areas" they will be placed at the rear of the grid and be started without any time delay. Otherwise, they will be held in the pit lane and be released to start the race after the last car to start the Green Flag Lap or the last car to take the start has passed the start line or pit lane exit, whichever is the later. Such approval to start must be obtained from the Clerk of the Course.
- 3.3.7. Entry fee refunds may be made by the Championship Organisers at their discretion.
- 3.3.8. Each race meeting organiser may accept up to 20% more entries than specified on the track licence for each circuit and all accepted competitors may practice.
- 3.3.9. Reserves who practice in the correct session and set a time will take precedence, in reserve number order, over any accepted entry whose practice times are disallowed, or who does not set a time during the official practice for the Championship race.

3.4. Briefings

- 3.4.1. The Championship Organisers will notify competitors of the times and locations for all briefings in the final instructions. Competitors must attend all briefings.

3.5. Qualification Practice

- 3.5.1. The minimum period of practice to be provided is to be as specified in the current Motorsport UK Yearbook in respect of circuit lengths. Should any Practice Session be disrupted, the Clerk of the Course will not be obliged to resume the session or re-run sessions to achieve the championship criteria and the decision of the Clerk of the Course will be final. For those meetings where one practice session and 2 races any scheduled, drivers sharing cars must remember to allow time for both drivers to practice in the one session or arrange with the Clerk of the Course to practice 'out of session'. Normal Motorsport UK regulations will apply to competitors who practice 'out of session'.
- 3.5.2. Each driver should complete a minimum of 3 laps practice in the car to be raced and in the correct session in order to qualify for selection and order of precedence as set out in the Motorsport UK Regulation Q12.4 The Clerk of the Course and/or Stewards of the Meeting will have the right to exclude any driver whose practice times or driving are considered to be unsatisfactory as defined in the current Motorsport UK Yearbook.
- 3.5.3. The grid for race 1 will be decided by the fastest times in qualifying. The grid for race 2 will be the finishing order of race 1. Non finishers and competitors not classified in the race results will be placed on the back of the grid in order of distance covered. In the event of a tie the order will be at the discretion of the Clerk of Course.

3.6. Race

The standard minimum scheduled time will be 15 minutes ,whenever practicable, but should any race time be reduced at the discretion of the Clerk of the Course or Stewards of the Meeting it shall still count as a full points scoring round provided that 8 minutes has elapsed. If the duration is less than 8 minutes, half points will be awarded.

3.7. Race Start

- 3.7.1. All races will commence with a Green Flag lap and a Rolling Start
- 3.7.2. All cars will form up in grid order on the start line at the start of the Green Flag Lap(s) in the formation as specified on the Track Licence for the Circuit.
- 3.7.3. Towards the end of the Rolling Lap the grid will be slowed to an appropriate speed by the course car. The course car will then drive into the pit lane and maintenance of the grid's speed on the approach to the start line will become the responsibility of the driver in pole position. All cars will start racing when the red start lights are turned off.
- 3.7.4. Any cars not able to take the Green flag lap or driven into the pits under the Green Flag shall be held in the pit lane. They may then start the race after the last car to take the start from the grid has passed the start line or pit lane exit, whichever is the later.
- 3.7.5. Any drivers unable start the Green Flag lap or start are required to indicate their

situation by raising a hand in the air. Any drivers unable to maintain grid positions on the Green Flag to the extent that all other cars are ahead of them, may complete the Green Flag Lap but they MUST remain at the rear of the last row of the grid but ahead of any cars to be started with a time delay.

- 3.7.6. Weaving to warm-up tyres using more than 50% of the track width, or falling back in order to undertake practice starts, is prohibited.

3.8. Session Red Flagged

- 3.8.1. Motorsport UK Regulation Q12.15 applies
- 3.8.2. **During qualifying:** Should the need arise to stop any qualifying session, red lights will be switched on at the Start Line and red flags will be displayed at the Start Line and at all Marshals Signalling Points around the Circuit. This is the signal for all drivers to cease circulating at racing speeds, to slow to a safe and reasonable pace and to return to the pitlane. Overtaking on slowing down lap is prohibited.
- 3.8.3. **During the race:** Should the need arise to stop a race, red lights will be switched on at the Startline and red flags will be displayed at the Startline and at all Marshals Signalling Posts around the circuit.

This is the signal for all drivers to cease circulating at racing speeds, slow to a safe and reasonable pace and to return to the starting grid which will automatically become a Parc Ferme area. No overtaking is permitted on the slowing down lap.

Cars should not enter the pitlane unless directed to do so or unless repairs are necessary. Work on cars already in the pitlane must cease when a race is stopped and may only continue under the control of Scrutineers. Cars which are in the pitlane or who enter the pitlane may ONLY re-start from the pitlane (not the grid) after all other cars have re-started. Non-runners at the time of the stoppage (which have been recovered) can re-start from the pitlane behind those referred to above.

- 3.8.4. **Red flag at less than full race length**

- 3.8.4.1 **Case A** - Less than two laps completed by Race Leader.

The race will be null and void. The race will restart from the original grid positions. Competitors unable to take the re-start may be replaced by nominated reserves who will start from the pitlane in reserve number order and in front of any other pitlane starter. Gaps on the grid should not be closed up. The length of the restarted race will be determined by the Clerk of the Course. Any competitor not running at, or being the cause of, the deployment of a red flag will only re-start at the discretion of the Clerk of the Course, from the pit lane behind any nominated reserves in the order determined by the Clerk of the Course. Gaps on the grid should not be closed up.

- 3.8.4.2 **Case B** - More than two laps completed by Race Leader but less than 75% of Race Distance.

The race will restart from the grid set out by the finishing order of part one, (as per MOTORSPORT UK Regulation Q 12.15.2. The final result of the race will be the finishing order of part 2. The length of the restarted race will be determined by the Clerk of the Course.

- 3.8.4.3 **Case C.** If the leader has completed more than 75% of the race distance or duration

The race will not usually be re-started (as per Q 12.15.4). If not re-started the results will be based on the order of crossing the finish line at one lap less than at the time of first showing the Red Flag. Only cars which are under their own power at the showing of the Red Flag will be classified.

3.8.5. **Re-Scrutiny**

All vehicles reported involved in contact incidents during races or practice must be re-presented to the Scrutineers before continuing in the races or practice

3.9. Pits, Paddock & Pitlane Safety

3.9.1. **Pits & Paddock**

Competitors must ensure that the MOTORSPORT UK Circuit Management & Organising Club Safety Regulations are complied with at all times.

3.9.2. **Pitlane**

The outer lane or lanes are to be kept unobstructed to allow safe passage of cars at all times. The onus shall be on all drivers to take all due care and drive at minimum speeds in pit lanes.

3.9.3. **Refuelling**

Refuelling may only be carried out in accordance with the Motorsport UK Regulation Q13.1.1 Circuit Management Regulations and the SRs or final instructions issued for each Circuit/Meeting.

3.9.4. **Speed Limit**

Pitlane speed limit will be that notified in the Final Instructions for each meeting.

3.10. Race Finishes

After taking the Chequered Flag drivers are required to: Progressively and safely slow down, remain behind any competitors ahead of them, return to the Pit Lane Entrance/Paddock Entrance Parc Ferme as instructed by

Marshals or Officials and to keep their helmets on and harnesses done up while on the Circuit or in the pit lane.

3.11. Results

All practice timesheets, grids, race results are to be deemed Provisional until all vehicles are released by the Scrutineers after post Practice / Race Scrutineering and / or completion of any procedures, Judicial or Technical. (Motorsport UK Regulation D 26.3

3.12. Timing Transponders

- 3.12.1. All competitors are required to fit a lap timing transponder to their cars for the purposes of accurate timing. Holders for these and detailed fitting instructions are issued with the transponders and it will be the responsibility of the competitor to fit these in the car in the position and manner specified. The transponder must be in place and functioning correctly for all Championship qualifying practice sessions and races. Failure to function may result in loss of grid or race position.
- 3.12.2. Competitors may not place electronic timing equipment for trackside timing within ten metres of the official Start, Finish or any other official timing lines at any event or test session/day. Any such equipment placed within these zones will be removed.

3.13. Safety Car Operation

The Safety Car will be brought into operation and run in accordance with Section Q, Appendix 3 of the Motorsport UK General Regulations at the discretion of the Clerk of the Course

3.14. Code of Practice

By registering for the Championship all competitors and their associates commit to The WSSCC Code of Practice (See Appendix 2) and to positively promote and demonstrate the Motorsport UK's Respect Code (See Appendix 3).

- 3.14.1. Where any reports of disrespectful conduct are judged to be well founded the Championship organisers may issue warnings or require remedial actions and/or report the matter to the Championship Stewards who may impose appropriate penalties which can include loss of Championship points and/or race bans through to Championship Expulsion and referral to Motorsport UK.
- 3.14.2. It is imperative that we promote the safety and wellbeing of young people and adults at risk. In addition to this all participants must be aware of their behaviour and conduct at all times and abusive language and harmful behaviour will not be tolerated. Any such incidents must be reported to the Championship Coordinator and/or Safeguarding Officer who will also relay the report to Motorsport UK. Details of the Motorsport UK Policies and Guidelines are available at www.motorsportuk.org/resource-centre by selecting Policies and Guidelines.

4. Technical Regulations

4.1. Introduction

The following Technical Regulations are set out in accordance with the Motorsport UK specified format and it should be clearly understood that if the following texts do not clearly specify that you can do it you should work on the principle that you cannot. If in any doubt regarding championship or class eligibility confidential advice can be sought from the championship organisers.

- 4.1.1. The Welsh Sports & Saloon Car Championship (WSSCC) is for competitors participating in a wide variety of Series Production Road Sports and Saloon Vehicles (as defined by the Motorsport UK current yearbook Section B) according to the classes specified in these regulations.
- 4.1.2. **Definitions** All cars must comply with the specific definitions in the current Motorsport UK Year Book (Nomenclature & Definitions Section B
- 4.1.3. The Championship specifically excludes mid-engined sports racing cars as described in The Terminology of the Motorsport UK current Yearbook. Examples of such cars are Jades, Radicals and Sports 2000 cars. Single seater open wheel racing cars are also excluded.
- 4.1.4. For reciprocating engines, a forced induction equivalence formula of 1.7:1 will be applied.
- 4.1.5. For rotary engine cars, an equivalence formula of 1.4:1 will be applied.
- 4.1.6. For forced induction, rotary engine cars an equivalence formula of 1.5:1 will, in addition, be applied giving a total equivalence formula of $1.4 \times 1.5 = 2.1:1$

4.2. Safety Requirements

- 4.2.1. All cars must comply with Section Q: Specific Regulations for Circuit Racing and Section K: Competitor Safety of the 2023 Motorsport UK Regulations - some of the more important regulations are detailed in 4.4.4 to 4.2.11 below.
- 4.2.2. All cars, apart from Motorcycle Engined Cars, must be fitted with an operational reverse gear.
- 4.2.3. Roll Over Protection Systems (ROPS) must be fitted complying with Motorsport UK Regulation K1 & Q13..
- 4.2.4. Seat Belts - 5 point as a minimum standard as detailed in Motorsport UK Regulation K 2.1 must be fitted
- 4.2.5. A Frontal Head Restraint (FHR) device must be used as detailed in Motorsport UK Regulations K 10.4

- 4.2.6. All drivers of open cars must wear hand restraints during qualifying and race.
- 4.2.7. Fire extinguisher: Motorsport UK Regulations Section K3.1 applies. All extinguishers must be serviced regularly to the manufacturers specification and have a current in-date labelling.
- 4.2.8. Battery etc- The fitting of an External Circuit Breaker to Motorsport UK Regulation Q13.9 applies.
- 4.2.9. Red Warning Light - The fitting of a Rear Red Warning Light to Motorsport UK Regulation K 5.1.
- 4.2.10. Towing Eyes - The fitting of Towing Eyes front and rear to Motorsport UK Regulation Section Q13.1.3
- 4.2.11. The use of tyre heating/heat retention devices, tyre treatments and compounds is prohibited.

4.3. Classes

The following classes, as defined in the Motorsport UK Regulations Section B, are permitted in the WSSCC.

- 4.3.1. Series Production Cars and Production Kit Cars
- 4.3.2. Specialist Production Cars and Touring Cars
- 4.3.3. In addition, Motorcycle Engined Cars which can use any type of motorcycle engine and transmission and are exempt from the requirement to have an operational reverse gear are permitted.
- 4.3.4. Super Cars are cars that do not obviously fit into other classes. Such cars could be V8 Stars, Eurocars, Silhouettes, cars built specifically for racing such as the Ginetta G50/G55. Production Kit cars over 1600cc plus any saloon, road sports and GT cars that no longer retain the original locations or configuration of engine or suspension mounting points as per the original manufacturer specifications and so are not eligible for other classes.

4.4. WSSCC Class structure

- 4.4.1. **Class 1** - Saloons, Road Sports, and GT Cars up to 2000cc. Tyres must be List 1A treaded tyres.
- 4.4.2. **Class 2** - Saloons, Road Sports, and GT Cars up to 2000cc. Tyres are free.
- 4.4.3. **Class 3** – Saloons, Road Sports and GT cars over 2000cc. + Motorcycle Engine Cars + Production Kit Cars up to 1600cc Tyres are free

4.4.4. **Class 4** – ‘Supercars’ up to 2000cc + Production Kit cars up to 2000cc. Tyres are free.

4.4.5. **Class 5** – ‘Supercars’ over 2000cc + Production Kit cars over 2000cc. Tyres are free.

4.5. Vehicle Specification

4.5.1. All competitors must provide the Championship Organisers with a fully completed Vehicle Registration Form before the event in which they intend to compete if they want to qualify for points and awards. Full details of the cars technical specification must be included on this Vehicle Registration form. In respect of cars from a ‘One make’ series, the driver should have and forward a copy of the appropriate Motorsport UK Technical Regulations for the Championship to which the car was eligible to the Championship Co-ordinator.

4.5.2. It is the competitor’s responsibility to ensure cars comply with the class regulations

4.5.3. All drivers of open cars must wear hand restraints during qualifying and race

4.5.4. Provision for sealing the engine and gearbox must be made if requested by the Eligibility Scrutineer.

4.5.5. To ensure fair competition, the Championship Organisers reserve the right to re-classify certain individual car and driver combinations.

4.5.6. In any dispute as to what class a car should be in, then the decision of the Eligibility Scrutineer will be final.

4.6. General Technical Requirements.

4.6.1. Chassis and bodywork

The floor pan, sill, door surrounds, roof and bulkhead must be in construction, material and size as originally manufactured. The chassis and floor pan can be reinforced and suspension mounts turreted. Inner wings and bulkheads can be modified to allow clearance for the Induction system. The wheelbase must remain to the original dimension within a tolerance of + or – 50 mm.

Interior

- 4.6.1.1 Carpets, insulation, linings and passenger seats can be removed. Controls can be altered but the driver must sit completely on one side or the other of the of the centre line.

4.6.2. Exterior and Bodywork

- 4.6.2.1 Headlamps need not be retained.
 - 4.6.2.2 The standard door panels, boot, bonnet and wings may be replaced with ones of a lighter material. Glass lenses can be replaced with plastic, as can side and rear windows.
 - 4.6.2.3 Stoplights must work.
 - 4.6.2.4 Front spoilers air dams/splitters are permitted below the level of the road wheel centres and not extending more than 100 mm beyond the overall periphery of the existing bodywork excluding bumpers.
 - 4.6.2.5 Rear spoilers and wings are permitted within the overall plan periphery of the original vehicle excluding bumpers.
 - 4.6.2.6 the height of any rear wing may not exceed the height of the ROPS of an open car or the roof line of a closed car.
 - 4.6.2.7 The fitting of a diffuser is allowed.
 - 4.6.2.8 The silhouette as seen in the side elevation must remain unaltered above the road wheel hub centres of the original production car at normal ride height.
- 4.6.3. Minimum ground clearance must be as specified in Motorsport UK Regulation Q 13.1.2 (i.e 4cm). In addition, no part of the car may touch the ground if any one tyre is deflated.
 - 4.6.4. For production based cars the engine must be the same configuration as fitted to the original car, cylinder heads may be modified and the location of the engine block must remain within + or - 50mm of the location on the original car.
 - 4.6.5. Oil/Water Cooling - Oil coolers and radiators must remain within the original periphery of the bodywork.
 - 4.6.6. Suspension- Permitted Modifications - Dampers are free, however the suspension type must be as per original manufacturer, original mountings must be retained even if not used.

- 4.6.7. Transmissions - Permitted Modifications - The gearbox and differential are unrestricted but must remain within + or - 50mm of the original location. Transaxles are not allowed unless fitted as original equipment.
- 4.6.8. Electronic Engine Management may be modified from standard.
- 4.6.9. Brakes are unrestricted, other than as specified in Motorsport UK Regulation J 5.6.1 and J.5.6.2
- 4.6.10. Wheels/Steering -Unrestricted, other than as specified in Motorsport UK Regulation J 5.7.1 to J 5.7.5 and J 5.8.1 to J5.8.3
- 4.6.11. The use of tyre heating / heat retention devices is prohibited.
- 4.6.12. Fuel Tank/Fuel – Must comply with Motorsport UK Regulation J 5.13.1 to J 5.13.8
- 4.6.13. Fuel & Fuel Systems will be in accordance with J 5.13.1 to J.5 13 .8 and Section B. Nomenclature and Definitions in the current Motorsport UK Yearbook. Definitions of Petrol, LPG, Diesel, Bio Ethanol and Bio Diesel are as Pump Fuel section of 'The Terminology'.
- 4.6.14. Exhaust Silencing must comply with Motorsport UK Regulation J 5.17
- 4.6.15. Numbers and Championship Decals must comply with Motorsport UK Regulation J 4.1
 - 4.6.15.1 Numbers must be clearly displayed on either side of the car and on the bonnet in a position acceptable to the Timekeepers.
 - 4.6.15.2 The Class identification number allocated to the car must be displayed on the bonnet of the car
 - 4.6.15.3 Championship and Class Sponsors decals must be displayed in un-obscured positions on both sides of the car in positions outlined by the coordinator. Failure to comply with this may result in the loss of championship points or prizes

4.7. Infringements of Technical Regulations.

- 4.7.1. For infringements arising from post practice Scrutineering or Judicial Action: Minimum Penalty: The provisions of Motorsport UK Regulation C3.5.1 (a) and (b) will be applied
- 4.7.2. For infringements deemed to be of a more serious nature the Clerk of the Course and/or Stewards of the Meeting are to invoke the provisions of Motorsport UK Regulation C 3,5,1 (c)

4.7.3. For offences under Motorsport UK Regulations C 1.1.5, C 1.1.6, the Clerk of the Course, may impose a championship penalty in the form of the following:

4.7.3.1 For an offence in qualifying; a grid penalty of up to ten places

4.7.3.2 For an offence in a race where the offending driver is not classified; a grid position penalty in the next race/event.

All competitors are deemed to have agreed to the following:

I understand that:

- 5.2.1. The championship will be administered by the committee of the WRDA or any sub-committee ie. the Championship Steering Committee, it shall authorise for the purpose. They will advise & assist the Championship Co-ordinator who will liaise with them.
- 5.2.2. Ideally such Committee should include at least 2 independent representatives of the championship, who should either be nominated by their peers at the Annual Championship Conference to sit on the Championship Steering Committee, or can be co-opted as is normal practice,
- 5.2.3. To ensure fair competition the organisers reserve the right to re-classify certain individual car and driver combinations.
- 5.2.4. That neither I, nor any member of my team or anyone who purports to have any connection with me or any member of my team, will make any adverse comments to the press or media or via social media. I understand that if any such comments are printed or broadcast, I may be called to give account of said comments.
- 5.2.5. This also applies to misbehaviour or unfair practice.
- 5.2.6. Drivers must try to avoid contact with other cars, and must give each other 'racing room', at all times. When weaving to 'warm up' tyres on the Green Flag lap, drivers must be aware of the other drivers on the grid ensuring that they do not obstruct or come into contact with them.
- 5.2.7. The steering committee reserve the right of censure in respect of all items in the code of practice.
- 5.2.8. In extreme cases, following the appropriate hearing, the Championship organisers may refund my registration fee and request that I take no further part in the championship. This does not prejudice the normal rights of appeal as allowed for in the Motorsport UK Yearbook..
- 5.2.9. That telephone calls to officials should be made after 9.00 a.m. and before 9.30 p.m.
